

Cox's Bazar CSO-NGO Forum (CCNF): A network of local CSOs and NGOs in Cox's Bazar to promote a human Rights and gender responsive society through positive engagement with the government. It is also promoting the localization agenda at the local level. JNUS is the active member of this forum.

Protection from Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA): It is a network of organisations who are directly involved in preventing sexual exploitation and abuse. JNUS is an active member of this network.

NGO Platform: This network, established in 2018 is the platform of more than 100 local, national and international NGOs active in the humanitarian response programs in Cox's Bazar. The key functions of the network include information sharing and coordination, humanitarian advocacy, representation, capacity strengthening and enhancing partnerships and accountability among NGOs. JNUS is an active member of this network.

Bangladesh Women's Humanitarian Platform: This network of women-led organisations is maintained by OXFAM, Bangladesh. JNUS is the active member of this platform.

Association of Development Agencies in Bangladesh (ADAB): ADAB is the leading and largest coordinating organisation of the NGOs working in Bangladesh. JNUS is the partner of ADAB.



#### **Global Level**

Global Network of Women Peace-Builders (GNWP): GNWP amplifies women's, young, and girls' voices for more sustainable and inclusive peace. In partnership with local communities affected by violent conflicts and humanitarian crises, GNWP implements programs that build peace in local communities, teach women and girls how to read and write, promote women and girls to be peacebuilders, leaders, and decision-makers, and improve women's economic status. It enables the creation of equal, resilient and peaceful communities.

GNWP is a coalition of over 100 women's rights organisations from over 40 countries around the world. JNUS is a partner of this coalition.

As part of The Global Network of Women Peacebuilders' (GNWP) ongoing work with young Bangladeshi women and Rohingya women and girls in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh via its Young Women for Peace and Leadership (YWPL) Program, Jago Nari Unnayon Sangstha (JNUS) is implementing the project entitled: Empowering Women to Contribute to Sustainable Peace.

Generation Equality Forum's Women, Peace, and Security (WPS) and Humanitarian Action (HA) Compact: It is a global network to bring together key supporters and champions of the WPS and HA agendas to focus on monitoring and accountability, coordination and financing to implement WPS and humanitarian action commitments. JNUS is a member of this network.

Global Alliance for Humanitarian Innovation (GAHI): It is a network that connects governmental actors , knowledge institutes, businesses and humanitarian organisations to promote innovation in the humanitarian sector . The GAHI aims to aims to address the innovation needs of the sector that cannot be effectively tackled by individual actors working on their own . It does so by matching problems to people that might solve them , mobilising social, intellectual and financial resources and sharing knowledge of what works.

International Council of Voluntary Agencies (ICVA): ICVA is a global network of non-governmental organisations which was established in 1962 whose mission is to



make humanitarian action more principled and effective by working collectively and independently to influence policy and practice. <u>ICVA has almost 140 NGO members operating in 160 countries worldwide</u>. JNUS is one of the active members.

#### **Community Level**

Women's Forum for Building Social Cohesion: Thirteen Women's Forum for Building Social Cohesion have been formed comprising women leaders of Rohingya and host community supported by the National Endowment for Democracy (NED). Eight groups with twenty members in each, have been organised at Camp 9, Camp 26 and Camp 27 and five groups have been formed in adjacent host communities. These women forums are organising dialogues, discussions and consultations with other stakeholders at the community level to develop common understanding on issues affecting the safety and security of the women in both communities. They are also trying to generate mutual understanding how to expand opportunities for the



women in both communities. It is expected that the activities of these forums would contribute to enhance social cohesion between Rohignya and host community.



Training on Peace Building and Social Cohesion with Young Women Leaders

Young Women Leaders (YWLs): JNUS, in partnership with GNWP, has been running a network of young women leaders in Cox's Bazar to promote literacy education, social cohesion, leadership and economic empowerment. These young women leaders are very much active to undertake advocacy on various issues relating to gender equality and women empowerment at the local level. At the moment, they are running literacy

classes with 60 adult women of host community in Cox's Bazar. They are also planning to organise dialogues with different stakeholders including religious leaders and members of civil society to forward various issues related to women, peace and security

Women Groups in Rohingya and Host Community: JNUS, in association with Aino Salish Kendra and UN Women, has formed twelve women groups, six with women of host community and six with the women of Rohingya Refugee Camps, for promoting women's participation in peace-building and social cohesion initiatives. Each group comprises of twenty women leaders who are provided with training on GBV and role of paralegal. Three women from each group will play the role of Maitree Apa in both communities. These women groups are engaged in building communication, collaboration and cooperation among women leaders of both Rohingya and host community with an aim to explore opportunities for developing mutual understanding and mutual trust between them. They are also active to play the role of mediator in their respective community.

**Self Help Groups:** Forty Five Self Help Groups (SHGs) were formed in Ukhiya Uapzilla of Cox's Bazar in 2018. Each group had twenty members, fourteen of them were adolescent girls and women and six of them were adolescent boys and men. These groups are still active to prevent GBV, human rights violations through offering legal aid, alternative dispute resolution and referral to the vulnerable women and



women victims at the community level. They are also playing the role of mediators to safeguard and protect the rights of the women victims in Rohingya and host community in Cox's Bazar.

Ramu Sampriti Parishad (RSP): This Parishad was formed in 2018 under, "Strengthening Inter-Community Engagement against Violent Extremism" project supported by "USAID: Road to Tolerance" initiative. The Parishad comprised of members from civil society, women leaders, local influential actors including religious leaders and teachers to promote social cohesion across communities and institutions at Ramu Uapzilla in Cox's Bazar. The Parishad always remains vigilant to any forms of extremism and take quick response as such to address the issue in the form of dialogue, discussion and consultation. Their social network, ability to influence other are considered a big asset for establishing peace and stability in the society

Influential Women's Network: Two Hundred Influential women of eight upazillas in Cox's Bazar have created this platform under the leadership of JNUS. These women have been playing a commendable role in all Upazilas of Cox's Bazar by organising alternative dispute resolutions involving relevant stakeholders. They are very active to ensure the rights of women and girls and facilitate the participation of women in decision making process to raising their voice on their rights. These women are also independently taking initiatives to promote awareness against GBV and violence against women and girls.


#### JNUS Women's Lawyer Association (JWLA)

JNUS has recently formed a network titled 'JNUS Women's Lawyer Association' consisting of ten prominent women lawyers in Bangladesh. The members of this association are dedicated and committed to extend any form of legal support to the helpless, poor, vulnerable women and girls including women victims. It has been a long-cherished dream of forming this kind of association since JNUS started its operation in 2010 to strengthen the women's protection regime in the country. The primary objectives of this association are to provide legal aid support & policy advocacy for women to end all forms of discrimination and violence against women. JNUS Women's Lawyer Association (JWLA) is now in its early stage and planning to administer a series of activities to promote gender equality and end all forms of violence & sexual exploitation against women across the country.

At present, there are 35 members both in Dhaka and Cox's Bazar.




### 1.7 JNUS Organogram

#### 2.1 Preventing GBV through Empowerment

#### 2.1.1. Empowering Women to Contribute to Sustainable Peace

JNUS in collaboration with GNWP, empowered young women leaders in Cox's Bazar to promote literacy, social cohesion, leadership and economic empowerment. They actively advocated for gender equality and women's rights locally, conducting literacy classes and planning dialogues with key stakeholders on women, peace and security.

The project's overarching objective is to ensure that Bangladeshi, Rohingya, and Burmese women, particularly young women, are empowered to lead and participate in community-based peacebuilding and decision-making, as well as in local, national, regional, and global advocacy and political processes, thereby contributing to the end of the persecution of Rohingya and other marginalised ethnic communities, and more effective implementation of the WPS and YPS resolutions towards greater inclusivity.

#### **Results of the Community Theatre Shows:**

Each performance concluded with an immediate, enthusiastic response from the audience. They realised that these social concerns are pervasive and damaging in their community. Due to the established power relations and gender roles in the society, the engagement of men and boys is crucial for addressing these social difficulties. Men and boys have been encouraged to attend community theater performances by the YWLs. With the introduction of the emergency hotline number and service provider contact information, it is predicted that the number of incidents reported will increase.



#### **Peace Initiatives:**

These initiatives aim to prevent child marriages, advocate for women's education, and strengthen the ability for peacebuilding of a group of transgender women and non-binary individuals in Bangladesh. There were a total of 236 participants in these peace projects.

Peace Dialogue Organised by Gender-diverse People

The YWLs and JNUS team collaborated to create a quick guide to protect girls in Cox's Bazar from early, forced, and child marriage, as well as a three-page document on the importance of women's education in Bangladesh. These are big achievements for the initiatives. Through these initiatives, 120 individuals are made aware of the negative



effects of early and child marriage, 90 individuals are made aware of the significance of women's education, and 26 transgender women and non-binary individuals get the opportunity to increase their peacebuilding ability.

#### **Radio Programmes:**

The goal of these Radio Programmes is to promote public awareness about harmful practices such as human trafficking, child marriage, and gender-based violence so that the community may come together to put an end to these practices.

#### **Result of the Radio Programmes:**

In June and July 2022, JNUS arranged three radio programs with Radio Saikat (90.00 FM) featuring three young women leaders and two guests. As the radio station's coverage extends to the entire Cox's Bazar Region, awareness messages regarding human trafficking, child marriage, and gender-based violence have been disseminated there. It is anticipated that the rate of these harmful acts will diminish gradually following the airing of the radio program, as members of the community may take action to prevent the practices in their area.

#### **Literacy & Numeracy Classes in the Rohingya Camp:**


From March to May 2022, JNUS held 40 literacy and numeracy classes in the Rohingya refugee camp, which were led by YWLs. Sixty adult Rohingya women have attended classes. In addition to basic Math and English, topics such as gender discrimination, gender-based violence, early, forced and child marriage, gender equality, and the importance of women's literacy have been discussed

The participants can now solve basic math problems and count numbers. The participants can also construct short English sentences and write their names, family members' names, and addresses. In addition, the participants are aware of gender discrimination, gender-based

violence, early, forced, and child marriage, and the importance of women's literacy. If



they pursue advanced literacy, it is expected that they will easily take on leadership roles in their community.

#### Socio-economic initiative

This initiative aims to empower local women economically so that they may participate in family and community decision-making. The Socio-economic project is headed by Suprava Barua, a YWL from a poor and marginalised community. After providing the local women with raw materials, she has already collected some products from them. JNUS has assigned her an office corner with a table and display cabinet. She has already sold several products through her network and intends to establish a Facebook page to sell online

#### Result of Socio-economic Initiative:

The economic empowerment initiative includes one representative from the poor and marginalised community. It is predicted that local women will be economically empowered and will participate in decision-making and leadership roles as a result of the socio-economic initiative.

#### **Humanitarian dialogues:**

These dialogues aim to engage Young Women Leaders (YWLs) in advocating with relevant stakeholders for an improvement in the condition of Rohingya Refugees in Bangladesh, with a focus on the needs of women and girls.



#### Results of the humanitarian dialogues:

Α dialogue with paper recommendations for the actors involved in the Rohingya response has been developed in partnership with YWLs. This document will guide humanitarian actors as they design their responses. The recommendations of the advocacy dialogue paper were disseminated to 18 delegates from UN Women,

WELTWG, local CSOs, and local administration. It is anticipated that these recommendations will serve as a guide for their action plans. The YWLs have the opportunity to participate in an advocacy campaign with humanitarian response actors, which will develop their leadership abilities.

## 2.1.2. Enhancing protection to female Volunteers and staff in the Humanitarian Response in Cox's bazar

JNUS has been conducting a research to understand the trends in safety and security of female staff and volunteers. The report and the guideline are awaiting to be published.

#### The progress on some activities during this period are as follows:

- Data Analysis and Assessment: The JNUS Team is continually analysing the transcript generated during the first phase of the project in addition to the planned second phase project activities. During this reporting period, the project team shared a detailed code book with level 1–4 coding with the GWI Team and received feedback from Ms. Angela Bourassa. The project team is now incorporating the GWI Team's feedback. After incorporating all of the feedback, the GWI Team will receive an updated code book. The JNUS Team maintains constant contact with the GWI Team in order to conduct a flawless data analysis.
- Communicating with potential respondents and sharing the Terms of Reference (ToR): The project team is contacting potential respondents according to the project outline and providing them with the project's Terms of Reference (ToR) in order to obtain their consent to participate in KII or FGD. The project team is currently receiving favorable feedback from potential respondents and organising interviews with them. If an individual is unable to participate in an interview, he or she refers a colleague who is an expert in the relevant field to the project team.
- **Key Informant Interviews:** During the period (Jan-Mar 2022), the project team conducted three KIIs with potential respondents taken from a list shared with the GWI Team. During this reporting period, the project team has conducted three KIIs with local political leader, gender specialist, and INGO safeguarding official. Once completed, the transcript of these interviews will be shared with GWI.
- Focus Group Discussion: During the reporting period, four focus group
  discussions were held with male members of the host community, female
  members of the host community, religious and community leaders of the
  host community, and male members of the Rohingya Community. Once
  completed, the transcript of these FGDs will be shared with GWI.

#### 2.2. Social Cohesion, Capacity Building, Climate Justice and DRR

## 2.2.1. Provision of critical multispectral support services in Rohingya and affected Host Community

JNUS implemented a multifaceted project to promote Localisation, Gender, Mainstreaming, Social Cohesion, and Disability Inclusion. Empowering Women, Promoting Gender Equality, and fostering social cohesion were key goals. The project also focuses on disability inclusion aimed to strengthen the community to enhance gender equality and promote social harmony.

Funding: Funded by Australian Aid Supported by BRAC

#### 2.2.2. PRISE (Partnership Reinforcement for Integrated Skills Enhancement)

JNUS, in association with BRAC, implemented a project entitled PRISE (Partnership Reinforcement for Integrated Skills Enhancement) from April 2022 to February 2023 funded by the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC) at two unions of Ramu Upazila in Cox's Bazar Bangladesh. The objective of the project is to provide skills development training on Mobile Phone Servicing (MPS) IT support services, Tailoring and Dress Making (TDM) and wood furniture among drop out students (14-18 ages), Divorcee (18-20 ages) and persons with disability (14-20 ages) and ensure their job placement. In this project, JNUS set up two training centres at two unions of Ramu and provided training to 100 learners of the above mentioned category. After receiving training, job placement had been ensured for most of the learners and few of them became self-employed.

**Goal:** Strengthen social cohesion and reduce fragility by mitigating the negative consequences of the Rohingya crisis on vulnerable communities in Cox's Bazar.



**Objectives of the Project**: To develop employable skills and job linkage for marginalised and disadvantaged adolescents (Age 14 to 18) male and female to create a better opportunity for their livelihood and make them empowered. Poor and disadvantaged adolescents (Age 14 to 18) of the host community had profitable employment through this skill: Skills training in different trades through apprenticeship model based on market demand. After successful completion of training JNUS linked the learners with decent employment for Income Generating Activities (IGA).

#### **Planned Activities:**

- Provide training to 100 learners, 50% are female
- Basic orientation for learners: In the pre-training stage an important step is orientation of the learners. In this stage, the MCP, TT and PL must be present
- Support to technical trainers: Technical Tanners are people who teach the theoretical aspects of different trades. Trainers need to be supported with necessary classroom tools and well equipped classrooms.
- Support to MCP: PCPs are trainers for learners and have a minimum seed shop in the market with a good reputation in the market. MCPs need to be supported according to their respected trade and necessity.
- Support to Learners: Learner classrooms need to be convenient for them, must have proper toilets and clean water, support them according to safeguarding policy
- Support to Peer Leaders: Peer leaders sensitised towards the special needs of learners and should be able to counsel them when needed. They need to be supported efficiently since they deal with sensitive topics like child marriage, dowry, domestic violence, sexual education
- Stationary support for learners: Based on the tenure of use for stationary items it will be provided as per learners' number. Learners will have to replace lost of ruined items

Trained on Gender Based Violence (GBV) and paralegal roles, they acted as Maitree Apa' in both communication, collaboration and cooperation among women leaders from both communities aiming to cultivate mutual understanding and trust

### 2.2.4: Social Cohesion between host and Rohingya Communities

Jago Nari Limited (JNL), a subordinate organisation of Jago Nari Unnayon Sangstha a project funded by the National Endowment for (JNUS), has implemented Democracy (NED) titled, "Women in Promoting Social Cohesion between Rohingya and Host Communities in Cox's Bazar". The duration of the project is from October 2021 to September 2023. The project has been an important undertaking for the people of Cox's Bazar during the humanitarian crisis caused by the Rohingya influx in August 2017. With financial support from NED, JNL said it has provided three consecutive grants since 2019, by strengthening mutual trust between host communities and Rohingya refugees in Cox's Bazar. It clearly states that it has worked to build social cohesion. As part of these projects, JNL has launched various initiatives to encourage women leaders to influence warehouse operations and play a more active role in alleviating the increasingly hostile environment in Cox's Bazar. I have done a lot of activities. The project also develops leadership of women in Rohingya refugee camps and host communities, mobilizing their leadership to build forums/networks to develop mutual understanding and mutual respect on various issues between these two communities. It aims to contribute to the development of local conditions.

JNUS's project 'Women in building social cohesion in Cox's Bazar, 'empowers influential women from host communities to initiate discussions and dialogues with women in Rohingya Refugee camps. These women receive leadership and life skills

other women in both communities through group discussions. The project also engages them with various stakeholders, including youth and community leaders to foster cohesion. Thirteen forums have been formed, with seven in refugee camps and the rest in the host community.


JNUS partnered with ITAD Ltd a UK-based consultancy firm. To facilitate the collection of primary data in both host communities of Ukhiya and Teknaf.

The goal of this project was to enhance the capacity and confidence of selected CBO s and grass root organisation in use the Right to information (RTI) Act as a tool to ensure the public availability of information and support.

### 2.4. Climate Justice and DRR, GBV and Empowerment

### 2.4.1 Strengthening Women's Effort in Humanitarian Response in Cox's Bazar.

JNUS, with the supports of BRAC and Australian Aid, has been implementing this project since July 2020. The project has four components: Localisation Gender Mainstreaming, Social Cohesion and Gender Mainstreaming and Disability Inclusion. The localisation and gender main streaming component include, the formation of women groups; organising livelihood trainings, developing rapport with the standing committees at Union Level on women affairs, and finally administer research to explore the role of women to promote safety and security at the community level. The Social Cohesion component includes, trainings on peaceful use of social media, livelihood and GBV to increase the capacity of the women groups and formation of networks. It includes activities related to peace dialogues with community people, awareness campaign and screening events using video content. The final component on disability inclusion contributed to the preparation of a comprehensive list of persons with disabilities undertaking household visits. In addition, regular psychosocial counselling services are provided to the disable persons and their families and finally awareness campaign are organized across educational institutions to sensitise them about the rights of persons with disabilities.

Though, Bangladesh has made progress in women's health, education, and participation but they are continuing to suffer from insecurity, abuse, violence, and deprivation. Gender-Based Violence (GBV); abuse, forced marriage, and the absence



of freedom and association are largely prevalent among the women of the host community in Cox's Bazar. Indeed, the general climate of conflict and insecurity in Cox's Bazar, often fed by patriarchy and prejudices, ends up translating into violence against women at a variety of levels. To better understand the potential role of women to prevent, resolve and mitigate conflicts and to enhance their role in socio-economic development in Cox's Bazar, a holistic and wider approach, which is multi-layered and multidimensional in nature, would perhaps be more useful and effective as a tool to empower them against the lurking threat of violence, including GVB. In light of this, JNUS proposes a three-dimensional perspective of conflict to situate the role of women in Cox's Bazar to promote peace and security, empowerment, livelihood, social cohesion, and inclusion of disability, where women can play a critical and catalytic role.

Funding: Supported by BRAC and Australian Aid

**Duration:** January 2021 to December 2022

**Activities:** 

This intervention is composed of four components of localisation; that includes awareness building among key social actors to prevent violence against women including GBV undertaking advocacy and networking, capacity building of the vulnerable strengthening livelihood; social cohesion; women for mainstreaming, and disability inclusion under the rubric of protection whereas, gender and human rights are the cross-cutting issues. The localisation component has sought to support vulnerable women through small scale livelihood projects for quick impact in the form of income generation and skills development. This also targeted to build the capacity of women in advocacy and networking, especially with LGEB. Social cohesion has particularly focused on developing mutual trust and understanding by preventing fake news, misinformation, and disinformation. The final component, disability inclusion, has focused on awareness campaigns to mainstream disable children in the educational institutions and the learning centres and providing psychosocial counselling to enable the families how to manage social stigma and trauma.



### 2.5. WASH and Health

# 2.5.1. COVID -19 Response in Rohingya Camps and Adjacent Host Communities in Bangladesh Project

The six-month project by JNUS aimed to improve knowledge and understanding of personal protection and good hygiene behaviors. It successfully installed 60 hand washing facilities, distributed 12.000 masks and offered mental health and counseling services to address –COVID-19 related psychological trauma. Local journalists and JNUS youth ambassadors were trained to promote COVID -19 prevention through community journalism and social media. It was funded by DEC and supported by Action Aid Bangladesh. This project duration was from September 2020 to February 2021 but JNUS is monitoring and following up the impact of this project. They are following up the Water, Sanitation and Hygiene related activities of previous projects. In regard to health-related activities JNUS provided Hygiene Kits and Nutrition Supplementary as Emergency Healthcare Services . Even though the project ended but JNUS is still following up the activities.
