The project aims to strengthen the resilience of vulnerable coastal communities in Bangladesh - particularly women, Indigenous peoples, and persons with disabilities - by addressing the multidimensional impacts of climate change through a participatory and gender-transformative approach. It seeks to understand the key environmental, social, and economic risks affecting human health, livelihoods, and well-being in the Chittagong and Cox's Bazar regions. Using feminist, community-led, and intersectional research methods, the initiative engages local populations in co-creating and testing sustainable adaptation and mitigation strategies. The goal is to build community capacity, enhance gender equity, and foster inclusive decision-making for climateresilient development. Ultimately, the research contributes to climate justice, social transformation, and sustainable livelihoods in Bangladesh's coastal zones.

## NAME OF PROJECT: EMPOWERMENT OF WOMEN IN FISHING COMMUNITY IN COX'S BAZAR, BANGLADESH FOR INCREASING THEIR RIGHTS IN LIVELIHOOD



### **Outcomes:**

200 women, 100 bengali and 100 Rakhaine, in Chaufoldandi Union of Cox's Bazar Sadar strengthened their rights in livelihood against the impact of climate change.

Learnings:

- Capacity building alone is insufficient; an intersectional and gender-responsive approach is essential.
- When women are empowered and supported, they can raise their voices and claim their rights.

# IMPROVING LEGAL SERVICES AND LITERACY WITH WOMEN TOWARD TENURE AND LAND RIGHTS IN CLIMATE RESILIENCE IN COX'S BAZAR, BANGLADESH

### Context:

- More Fishing communities live on government (Khas) land and face constant eviction threats.
- They endure discrimination, low wages, and lack of livelihood security.

### **Differentiated Impacts:**

- Rakhaine Women: Engage in nappi (fermented shrimp paste) production; face discrimination in market access, pricing, and resource control.
- Bengali Women: Work mainly as day laborers in dry-fish production; face wage inequality, poor working conditions, and limited bargaining power.
